The Faceby Rhododendrons: A report in the D and S this weekend about the damage don to the Rhododendrons in Harlow Carr Gardens in Harrogate during the current bad weather reminded me that Ruth S. had told me that the Rhododendrons at the top of the Red Road have also suffered badly. These Rhododendrons were planted somewhere in the late 1890's by the Sutton family when they were building their new Manor House and they must, at the same time, have surfaced the track up from the water splash with the red shale taken from the mine workings on the moor above, hence the name used by the Tinkler family across whose fields the track runs. Ruth knows it as the Old Road which may well be the original local names as it will be the route taken by the early inhabitants of Faceby down from their fields on the moor top to the steam and village below. The Rhododendrons were a fantastic sight last summer so it is hoped that they will recover quickly. Janet Linfoot

What better way to see more birds and help them at the same time than putting up some nestboxes? The first thing to think about is what you hope to attract, since different species have

different requirements. Most boxes are not used every year, so you may need to persevere, and maybe move them from one year to the next to find the best place. Oh, and it's not just birds that use them, for example, some bees do and they are worth watching too.

Some things to think about when putting up your nest box:

If nest boxes of the same type are too close together it may promote aggressive behaviour between neighbours. Keep them away from bird feeders too, to avoid disturbance. Shelter your box from the weather - the front should be slightly angled downwards to prevent rain from entering, and not facing the prevailing wind and rain or strong sunlight. Ideally, they should be 1-3m above the ground and fixed to tree trunks, fence posts or similar. If your box has a hole for its entrance, avoid obscuring it with foliage - a clear flight path is important. Make sure it isn't easily accessible to cats and think about adding a metal plate around the hole to deter squirrels. Conversely, open-fronted nest boxes should be hidden from view attached to a shrub or creeper covered wall or fence. A box with a 32mm entrance hole fixed on the wall of a house might attract House Sparrows, and you could try a terrace, as they like nesting communally. For Starlings try a box with a 45mm



Making your own nest box is fun and not difficult. Have a look at "Nest boxes: Your Complete Guide", available from the BTO shop to find out more. Wood is the best material and should be at least 15 mm thick to provide insulation. Use a water-based preservative on the outside and Looking out tor birds leave the inside bare; there is no need to add any lining. If you decide to buy one, you have a massive choice, so look around. Avoid bright

colours, whacky designs, and those incorporated with a bird table! Avoid too, boxes that have a perch on the front: they just make life easier for predators. Wherever your nestbox comes from, it must have a roof that can be opened easily for cleaning at the end of the season (a vital task come October, to eliminate parasites) and for visits to monitor progress. You can also get boxes that contain a camera.

To maximise the effect of your acquisition why not join the BTO's Nesting Neighbours scheme and record your success (or lack of it!). All the information gathered helps build their knowledge base and allows them to monitor our garden birds' breeding success.

More Faceby Water stories - In the 1950's Copperty Keld, high on the hillside above the village, did indeed feed the Manor and it also supplied water to Low Farm, which was

farmed by my father, David Saddington. He told me that our farm constantly suffered from low water pressure. Being a dairy farm, water was very important, for the cows to slake their considerable thirst when they came in for milking, to cool the milk, wash the machinery and clean the byres after milking. On going down to the Manor to investigate, he discovered the cause of the reduced pressure at Low Farm – the farmer at the Manor, who shall remain nameless, had left the tap open for water to run down the drain, whether needed or not!

Perhaps spurred on by this unneighbourly display, combined with the severe drought of the summer of 1959 and a request from the Reverend Robert Robson, Vicar of St Mary's and St Botolph's, my father was persuaded to become secretary of the Parish Meeting and take up the fight, which it was, to secure first rate utility services - water and electricity - for the village. He was offered a mediocre water supply, but successfully challenged the water board and secured services for the village, which were sufficient to cater for the existing need and future requirements ie for development then and now. Having achieved his goal he retired from the Parish Meeting to concentrate on farming and building a new farmhouse for his family. (It was his campaigning in the early sixties, which led to the installation of inside toilets at Carlton and Faceby Primary School, replacing the existing, ghastly earth closets.) The newly acquired services allowed for housing development to take place in the village. Mrs Brown of Bevan Croft being a beneficiary – developing the fields along Bank Lane, from the corner of Church Bank down to the entrance road into Whorl Hill, and subsequently choosing to move away from Faceby. Development also took place along Mill Lane. My father, of course also benefitted, creating Birch Drive and Cleveland View. He chose to stay in the house he built on the farm he loved until his death, at the age of 90, in 2014. Jean Copeland
