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Bilsdale School

All the children at Bilsdale have settled back into school after the half term break. They have really enjoyed seeing their Carlton friends on Teams for worship and Celebration Friday.

KS2 have really enjoyed the start of their new topic Potions. The topic began with an engage event where they predicted what may be in a large parcel and eventually unwrapped it to find a large bottle with a labeldrink me on it. This led to reading about the potion Alice in Wonderland found and deciding whether she should drink the potion. They looked in detail at the information and different features on labels from various bottles and containers and wrote a label for Alice's potion.

They have completed several experiments including testing the viscosity of various liquids and were amazed to find it took the salad cream three hours to travel down the ramp. They have been busy exploring the properties of solid liquids and gases including inflating a heart shaped balloon by mixing vinegar and bicarbonate to produce a gas. They have already learnt a lot about solid liquids and gases.

KS1 have been enjoying the start of their new topic, which compliments the KS2 topic, Muck Mess and Mixtures. They have had a Messy Morning where they explored all sorts of materials and their properties such as clay, jelly, shaving foam and cornflour. They have been listening to George's Marvellous Medicine and have been selecting ingredients to make their own potions. They have also been finding out about the different countries' food comes from, which food comes from plants and which from animals and what meals are healthy or unhealthy. They have looked through lots of different recipe books and learnt about following recipes and writing instructions.

All the children have taken part in activities for Children in Need exploring 'Five to Thrive' and Remembrance Day.



Children in Need

This year, Children in Need recognise the tough year it has been and have made mental health their focus. Each day has covered the five main aspects:

Connect – the importance of connecting with family and friends, talking about their feelings

Take notice – recognising their own feelings and needs. We've discussed the importance of sleep and eating healthily alongside this.

Get active – how physical activity supports mental well being

Be curious – how learning, hobbies and interests keep the brain active

Give – how acts of kindness give own our self-esteem a boost

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Class 3

Just like Bilsdale, Class 3 are enjoying the new topic, Potions. We discovered it took 46mins for tomato ketchup to travel down our ramp a lot slower than the 0.85 seconds that water took! We have explored the properties of solids, liquids and gases using balloons filled with ice, water and air. A keen class of artists, the children have loved observational drawing of different shapes bottles and have experimented with different techniques to make their own pot out of clay.



Class 1

Our topic for the half term is entitled "Can I Switch it On?" We will explore technology, investigate how things work and discover how technology has changed. We will tinker with old appliances, make simple circuits, use ICT equipment, compare old and new technologies, make our own toys and have a role play police station.

The children really enjoyed the first week of the topic but we have now had to move to remote learning. Although this was all set up ready to go, this has been the first time we have tried it out. So far it has been really successful and we have had lots of positive feedback – thank you parents for engaging and working so hard and imaginatively with your children.

As the term moves on we will switch on the Christmas lights and open the Christmas workshop! In preparation for our hard-working elves, we would appreciate donations of small lengths of smooth wood for our woodwork bench.

Home Learning

We would like to express our thanks and well done wishes to all those children who are going the extra mile and enjoying being creative and having fun at home. From making bath bombs, magical fairy dust, cupcakes to working towards the Green and Music Blue Peter Awards, We are delighted with all your hard work.

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The Children's Society and National Police Chiefs Council (NPCC) are working together to raise awareness among professionals including postal workers, delivery drivers and plumbers who are visiting people's homes and may be able to spot signs of abuse.

Their new campaign comes as most pupils face an extended summer break, with schools now not set to fully reopen until September. Young people being abused at home may be even more vulnerable during the lockdown as abuse is more easily hidden from view

The campaign's posters, designed by The Children's Society's national exploitation Prevention programme, urge people to 'Know, Look, Act'. The programme broadly works to prevent and improve responses to child sexual abuse and exploitation, child criminal exploitation, modern day slavery and human trafficking regionally and nationally in England and Wales, operating closely alongside statutory services, community groups and businesses to ensure they are equipped to identify and safeguarding children at risk.

Police forces across the country have been provided with the posters, along with businesses and professionals including supermarkets, restaurants and takeaways, foodbanks, job centres, Covid testing centres, transport operators, NHS 111 and social workers, youth workers, health visitors and midwives.

By raising awareness amongst neighbours and key workers of the signs to look for, they hope that children at risk might be safeguarded. Signs to watch out for include:

- Guarded behaviour around particular individuals
- Sudden changes in behaviour
- Bruises, burns, bite marks or fractures
- Children appearing withdrawn, anxious or frightened
- Hearing or seeing shouting and violence towards a child
- Children seen carrying or using drugs
- Children being late or arriving home late in different cars
- Unaccompanied children visiting a house where only adults

The Children's Society fears abuse, including child sexual abuse, may have been going undetected during the Covid-19 crisis because children are spending more time at home, where they are less visible to professionals like teachers and social workers and to the public.

The charity also has concerns that children may be being exploited in other people's homes – for instance, by being groomed by organised criminals to deal drugs from dangerous 'trap houses' in county lines operations.

People are being urged to stay curious, look beyond the obvious and report any concerns rather than attempting to intervene themselves. They are urged to notify their safeguarding lead if they are visiting in a professional capacity and to contact police on 101 or 999 in an emergency. They can also call the children's charity the NSPCC on 0808 800 500 for advice or guidance.
