Little Owls and Class 1

What a fantastic week we have had in EYFS! We began with a sunny and joyful Forest School session led by Mr Sims. The children displayed wonderful teamwork and kindness as they explored the natural world around them. We were delighted to welcome our new starters and their families. Thank you to all who joined us for our stay and play session and shared in a successful lunchtime together. It was a lovely opportunity to start building those all important connections.

This week, Little Owls have been enjoying our focus book Tiddler, a delightful tale that sparked lots of conversation and storytelling play. We have also been busy practising recognising our names, helping to build confidence and independence in daily routines. Reception children have been learning about the phonemes 'ay' and 'a_e' and had great fun discovering the magic of the split digraph! It's been lovely to see their excitement and engagement during phonics sessions. In maths, both Reception and Little Owls have wrapped up their work on patterns and have now moved on to exploring position and direction. Whether it's "under," "next to," or "behind," we've been using playful language and movement to describe where things are, so much fun! With the sunshine making a strong appearance, we have been extra busy watering our plants, what a great way to learn about caring for living things and noticing changes in our environment.

Finally, we have seen the Characteristics of Effective Learning in full action: exploring with enthusiasm, playing collaboratively, and thinking critically during both structured tasks and child-led play. We were so proud of the independence, resilience, and curiosity being shown every day - well done everyone!

Carlton and Bilsdale KS1

In readiness for our visit to Thorpe Perrow Arboretum, we have been thinking about plants and animals and how to identify them. Starting with a discussion question 'How do you identify a friend on the playground?' we thought about the different ways we can tell who each of us is. Do we recognise their face, their run, their voice or laugh? Do we look at how tall someone is or what they normally wear? Identifying plants and animals in a habitat is the same; we observe a plant or animal's physical features and behaviour and match it to pictures and descriptions. We then tested our observational skills and used spotter sheets to identify and name some of the plants and animals we may be lucky enough to spot at Thorpe Perrow. In art this week, we have continued our exploration of colour, looking at different hues of blue and different hues of red. What a collection of blue and red objects we managed to collect from our classroom! We looked at what was the same, what was different and then the children challenged themselves to mix base colours and explore how many hues they could make. We have also completed our final set of assessment booklets and all the children have shown great determination and resilience completing each booklet. Well done Class 2 - you have all been shining stars this week and I am proud of you all.

Carlton and Bilsdale KS2

How much have we learnt? This has been a theme this week with the children completing assessments in reading, grammar and maths. Yet again, the children have demonstrated our school vision with their determined focus and effort, doing their best and evidencing their knowledge and skills. The children have also had the opportunity to reflect on their writing looking back at their first pieces in September and identifying their own progress. There is still time this term to improve as we start a new writing unit next week and we still have some maths units to complete.

In science, we have built on last week's lesson learning about Carl Linnaeus and using his system of taxonomy to sort living things. Firstly, the children sorted pictures into the plant and animal kingdom. The animal kingdom was then subdivided into vertebrates and invertebrates. A video helped to reinforce the features of fish, birds, mammals, reptiles and amphibians with much discussion around sharks, dolphins and the duck billed platypus. There was new vocabulary for many as we subdivided the invertebrates into annelids, molluscs, arachnids, crustaceans, insects and myriapods. Ask your child if you would like to learn more.

<u>STEM Day</u>

Year 5 and 6 took part STEM day where they were able to ignite curiosity and be inspired to become the next generation of inventors in the fields of science, technology, engineering and mathematics. They all were an excellent role model for our school vision and took part in all the activities with determination resilience and independence.
