News from the Classes

Little Owls and Class 1

We have had a lovely and successful start back after the half term break! The children have returned with great enthusiasm and have quickly settled back into routines. We were amazed to see how much our sunflowers have grown and our caterpillars are changing every day. There's lots of excitement as we look forward to the next stage in their life cycle: the chrysalis.

In Reception, we've started a new topic in maths on sharing. The children particularly enjoyed using animal biscuits to explore the idea of sharing fairly, lots of fun and learning combined! Reception also really enjoyed their Ascension walk to Faceby Church on Monday afternoon, where they had the chance to reflect, explore the church environment, and take time to think about the meaning of Ascension in a peaceful and thoughtful setting. Little Owls have been busy working on patterns, creating some beautiful and thoughtful designs. They have also begun thinking about our exciting new topic: 'On the Beach', exploring initial ideas through discussion, stories, and themed play activities.

This week we were delighted to welcome Miss Hulme, Miss Booth, and Miss Savill (1st year student teachers) into our phonics sessions. The children have worked incredibly hard consolidating the digraphs and trigraphs er, ar, air, ure, or, ur, using them confidently in both reading and writing activities. We also focused on reading and spelling the common exception words 'little' and 'what', practising these through games, group reading, and sentence work. It was lovely to see the children applying their phonics skills with growing independence. We've also thoroughly enjoyed singing together around the piano this week. It was a joyful way to start our afternoon and build a real sense of togetherness in our classroom. In RE, we had a thoughtful and reflective discussion around the question: Which places are special and why? The children shared some lovely ideas and showed great respect for each other's thoughts.

Carlton and Bilsdale KS1

Our final half term has very quickly arrived and the children have all come back to school with tales of half term fun and looking rested and ready to go.

In our new science unit children are learning that a habitat is a place where plants and animals live, providing food, water, shelter and space; everything animals living there need to survive. They know that local habitats include parks, woodland, farmlands and gardens. Habitats beyond the locality include beaches, rainforests, deserts, oceans and mountains. In maths work on fractions continues, with children working on halves, quarters, thirds and recognising equivalent fractions. Perhaps you could divide some of your weekend meals and treats into fractions and make sure all parts are equal! Year 2s are busy on TTRS, ensuring their heat maps are green for x2, x5 and x10 times tables

Next week our Year 1 children will have their phonics screening check, something they are working very hard on. I am sure they will all do amazingly. Keep reading your phonics booklets over the week-end and perfect that sounding out.

Carlton and Bilsdale KS2

This week, KS2 have conquered mountains! In geography, they have learnt how mountains are made by the Earth's tectonic plates pushing together, moving apart or magma pushing land upwards. Using atlases and photos, the children have identified different types of mountains and located them. The children have also started writing a non-chronological report on Mount Everest tempting a reader to become a mountaineer and providing information about the Himalayas. If you want to know what the difference between a fold mountain and a dome mountain or how high a hill is to be classed a mountain, just ask KS2!

<u> Think Pharmacy First</u>

Most pharmacies in England are now providing the Pharmacy First service.

This free NHS service allows you or your child to get quick access to healthcare advice for the following seven conditions:

- Earache (aged 1 to 17 years)
- Impetigo (aged 1 year and over)
- Infected insect bites (aged 1 year and over)
- Shingles (aged 18 years and over)
- Sinusitis (aged 12 years and over)
- Sore throats (aged 5 years and over)
- Urinary tract infections (UTIs) in women (aged 16 to 64 years)

If you or your child has symptoms that suggest you may have one of these conditions, you can walk into a pharmacy and be offered a consultation with a pharmacist in a private consultation room.

The pharmacist will provide advice and, if clinically necessary, a prescription medicine to treat the condition (the normal NHS prescription charge rules apply to people aged 16 and over).
